SPIRITUAL PRACTICES: Lectio Divina

Our Catholic faith contains a rich treasury of powerful words: beloved prayers, timeless creeds, scripture readings, and liturgical texts. Words of Faith is a growing collection of bulletin inserts structured around these amazing words that teach us who we are, what we believe, and how we are to live.

We Hear

I would like in particular to recall and recommend the ancient tradition of lectio divina: the diligent reading of Sacred Scripture accompanied by prayer brings about that intimate dialogue in which the person reading hears God who is speaking, and in praying, responds to him with trusting openness of heart. If it is effectively promoted, this practice will bring to the Church—I am convinced of it—a new spiritual springtime. —Pope Benedict XVI

We Practice

The Second Vatican Council ignited a revival of scripture-based prayer and study in the Church. Catholics, whose bibles had been relegated far too often to decorations on the coffee table, began diving into our scriptures. One of the ways we have done so is through the practice of *lectio divina*, which as the Holy Father points out, is one of the most powerful ways of immersing ourselves in the Word of God. Literally "divine reading," lectio divina is a prayerful way of reading scripture or other spiritual writing that is typically broken into four movements known by their Latin names of *lectio, meditatio, oratio,* and *contemplatio.*

In the first movement, *lectio* (reading), we slowly and attentively read a selected passage, noting the words and images that draw our attention. Typically we read the passage several times, each time getting slower as the words and phrases begin to sink in. Although any passage may be chosen, it is common to pick a book of the Bible, especially one of the gospels, and slowly work through the entire book over several weeks or even months.

In the second movement, *meditatio* (meditation), we reflect or ruminate on the passage, particularly those words and images that drew our attention during lectio. This meditation occurs not in a monologue of our own thoughts, but in a dialogue between us and the Holy Spirit. We are not trying to figure out the scriptural


text as if the Word of God were a puzzle to be solved. Instead, we are seeking the illumination of the Holy Spirit so that through our reflections, we come to deeper spiritual insight and intimacy with the Word of God.

In the third movement, *oratio* (prayer), we take the fruits of our meditation and turn them into a prayer. We pray especially that the insights we received and the connection we developed with the Word of God during meditatio will be transformative for us in our daily lives.

In the fourth and final movement, *contemplatio* (contemplation), we use everything we have done so far as a launching pad on which we leave behind individual words printed on a page to rest in God with a profound inner silence. Contemplatio comes at God's initiative as a gift to us. To prepare for contemplatio, we simply offer to God the efforts of our lectio, meditatio, and oratio and place ourselves in God's loving embrace. As God comes to us in the silence, we do not simply read

the scriptures or other sacred writings, we become immersed in the readings and so become more intimately united with God.

At the Church of the Epiphany, we pray to God in many ways.
